10:30 – 12:00 pm	<p style="text-align: center;">Plenary Session 1 <i>International Regulator “Star Trek” & The TLC of the Future</i></p> <p>Once again we will bring regulators together from multiple continents to discuss a wide variety of issues, but with a specific focus on the “<i>regulatory agency of the future.</i>” An emphasis will be placed on agency operations – including how regulatory agencies can fairly and efficiently conduct licensing, enforcement, adjudications and other regulatory functions. The impact of the pandemic and how agency functions and operations have changed will be discussed.</p> <p>This session will preview the release of the IATR report entitled “<i>The Regulatory Agency of the Future</i>” and will seek feedback from panelists and the audience on the findings and ideas in said report. Discussion topics will include the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Enforcement:</i> Modernizing enforcement practices through technology, such as virtual inspections and automated enforcement inside and outside of the vehicle, which can more efficiently enforce regulations; • <i>Licensing Policies & Processes:</i> Creating a more efficient and fair licensing system through policies—incentivizing accessible and fuel-efficient vehicles, expediting licenses for drivers with jobs waiting—and processes, like remote licensing (using licensed fleets and agents), and online transactions; • <i>Self-Regulation:</i> Implementing a system that is similar to the U.S. state TNC model and the U.S. Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration Model oversight of motor carriers, with delegation of various regulatory functions to licensed mobility companies, subject to an audit process by regulators;



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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Governance Frameworks: Setting the appropriate governance framework (state vs. local) and who regulates which aspects of the industry (e.g., insurance requirements, driver licensing, vehicle standards). For example, state regulation could include driver standards, insurance, smart meters, reciprocity, while local regulation could focus exclusively on fares, supply/demand (permit numbers), etc.; • Fees, Revenue & Fines: Determining equitable and reasonable fees and fines, which should only cover costs of license issuance (and not be revenue based), and which strike the proper balance of fairness and equity given income levels of drivers and other licensees; and • Mobility Data: Setting data sharing and use practices, including determining what data is necessary, data protection and transparency, and use of data for enforcement and other purposes
<p>Noon – 1:30 pm</p>	<p>Luncheon & Hack-a-thon (Winner) Presentation</p> <p>2024 Hack-A-Thon: The winners of the 2024 competition, which focuses on AV-EV Equity, will present their innovative solutions to the challenge questions using mobility data, and will answer audience questions.</p>

Both purely private partnerships, including joint ventures and acquisitions for programs of interest, including EVs, vehicle rentals and data platforms (integration), as well as public-private partnerships (such as Mobility on Demand FTA Sandbox Program experiments with public transit first and last mile and accessible paratransit services) will be discussed.</p>

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<p>3:30pm – 5:00pm</p>	<p>This panel, hosted and organized by the IATR’s Health & Safety Committee, will explore where we are in terms of achieving Vision Zero goals. Not only will regulators discuss their safety programs that include enforcement, training, and positive reinforcement, but also the future of the movement will be debated. Discussions will be held on the use of open mobility data platforms and other government and private technology that use mobility data, AI, Automated Vehicles, telematics, and other technologies to assist in enhancing road safety and furthering Vision Zero goals, including automated enforcement and policy-making (MDS 2.0 and beyond). The panel will reach conclusions on how government agencies at all levels, the private sector and the academic community, can and should work together to achieve Vision Zero goals, as well as how IATR can help in doing so.</p>

<p>11:30 am – 1:00 pm</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Plenary Session 5 & Breakout Sessions 5 (A) – (D) <i>IATR Model Regulations for Accessible Transportation 2.0</i></p> <p>This series of breakout sessions will be preceded by introductions of the various breakout group leaders, and the coordinator/moderator of the workshop will deliver a presentation summarizing the existing IATR model regulations for accessible transportation, and identify the questions to be answered by each breakout group for potential comments to best and accepted regulatory practices.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Breakout Session 5(A) <i>Non-Emergency Medical Transportation Accreditation Commission (NEMTAC)</i> This session will discuss what regulators should do (if anything) with NEMTAC certification standards, in terms of possible legal mandates, incentives to obtain accreditation, accreditation to meet licensing standards (outsourcing), and the benefits and challenges involved in raising and implementing accessible service standards.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Breakout Session 5(B) <i>Public Paratransit Reform</i> This breakout will explore the MOD Sandbox Program with FTA, what public transit systems have been doing to deliver better accessible service, and how the system can deploy wheelchair accessible vehicles, through brokerage or other models, to make for a safer, more efficient, reliable and affordable service for people with disabilities.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Breakout Session 5(C) <i>Accessibility & Disruptive Technologies</i> The role of smartphone applications, connected and automated vehicles, electric vehicles, accessible data and software/dispatch innovations will be discussed.</p>



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	<p>Will these innovations help improve access or will they present new challenges to hinder progress.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Breakout Session 5(D) <i>The Costs of Accessibility – Vehicles, Insurance & Financing</i></p> <p>The business models of accessibility will be discussed and debated during this breakout session, including how to cover or reduce the higher costs involved in insurance and vehicle retrofitting. Brokerage models and changes underway in both public paratransit and subsidized NEMT services will be explored, to identify the ideal structure to programs to make for safer, affordable, sustainable, equitable and more efficient on demand accessible services. Who pays or who “should pay” is a the center of this discussion.</p>
